Remember these three words to help you stay safe:

STOP

When working with ladders outside, always start by surveying the area and identifying all power lines and electrical equipment.

LOOK

Know where power lines are located and make a plan to keep people and equipment away from them. Never attempt to trim trees near power lines.

LIVE

Keep all ladders and other tools **at least 10* feet** from any overhead power lines and always carry your ladder horizontally when moving it from one area to another. Stay aware and stay safe.

*Transmission lines (larger lines with higher voltages) require greater distances.
